We see the importance of righteousness here. Grace does not abound and reign apart for righteousness but, rather, *through* righteousness to eternal life. That righteousness is the *Righteousness of God* who is Jesus Christ our Lord.

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So why was Jesus baptized and why are we baptized?

While we can answer these questions in more than one way, we see something important when we focus on Jesus' baptism. Let's remember:

In no way did Jesus' baptism reflector symbolize a need to treat His own sins. He had no sins to have cleansed or forgiven. He had no need to be made righteous. He had no need to die for Himself.

So why was Jesus baptized?

After Jesus submitted to baptism, God the Father said, "This is my beloved son, in whom I am well pleased."
