Fellowship and the Church

A major issue for many people during this Covid Era is the loneliness and aloneness oppressing them. God created humans to be social. As a triune being, God is social, both within the Trinity and with mankind, His creation.

In this lesson, we will explore a bit of what the Book of Acts says about God's call upon us as a church to be social, to be together. At times, we will explore other books a bit as well.

Read the Following from the Book of Acts.

Together in the Book of Acts

1:4-6; 2:44; 3:1; 4:31; 10:24-27; 12:12; 13:44; 14:1; 14:27; 15:6; 15:30; 19:19; 20:7; 20:8.

Most of the words translated together are Greek compound words. Therefore, you might or might not find the word "together" in your English version of the Bible. For example, in Acts 2:1, the word, *homou*, which is translated "together" in most English versions is used. But in the KJV and NKJV, that verse replaces "together" with "with one accord." In Acts 1:14, the Greek word means "one accord" (NKJV) or "one mind," (NASB) but is translated elsewhere as together.

So we are not after specific words in this study, but rather we are trying to get an indication of the significance of the ideas of "together" and "one accord" in the New Testament by looking at the Book of Acts in English.
